SAINT OF THE WEEK



St. Stephen, is recognized as the first Christian martyr. He was one of the seven deacons chosen by the apostles in the early church to distribute food and aid to the poor and widows, a role emphasizing service and compassion (Acts 6:1-6). Stephen was a powerful preacher who performed miracles and defended the teachings of Jesus Christ with courage. His defense before the Sanhedrin, as recounted in Acts 7, is a remarkable speech that traces the history of Israel, emphasizing God's faithfulness and highlighting the persistent rejection of His messengers. Stephen's words angered his accusers, leading to his condemnation and subsequent stoning. In his final moments, he demonstrated Christ-like forgiveness, praying for his persecutors and committing his spirit to God. Stephen's martyrdom served as a catalyst for the spread of Christianity, as his death prompted the dispersion of believers from Jerusalem. His legacy endures as a symbol of steadfast devotion, inspiring countless to remain faithful in the face of persecution.

BLESSING OF WINE

The blessing of wine on St. John's Feast Day, celebrated on December 27, is a cherished tradition that honors the Apostle's miraculous deliverance from poisoned wine through his faith and trust in Christ. According to tradition, St. John blessed a cup of poisoned wine with the Sign of the Cross, rendering the poison harmless—a powerful symbol of God's protection. In memory of this miracle, the Church blesses wine on this feast day, invoking prayers for the physical and spiritual well-being of those who drink it. This act reflects the Catholic understanding of sacramentals, which draw the faithful closer to God through His grace. The blessed wine reminds us of the unity and salvation found in Christ's love, making this blessing a meaningful tradition that deepens the joy and faith of the Christmas season.

For the blessing—Before Mass, please leave your wine at the altar rail in front of the side altar (Mary's side).
