SAINT OF THE WEEK



St. Lucy, also known as Lucia of Syracuse, is a martyr whose life and death have inspired devotion and legend throughout history. Born in the late 3rd century in Syracuse, Sicily, she is celebrated for her faith and dedication to Christ, even in the face of persecution during Emperor Diocletian's reign.

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According to tradition, Lucy vowed to remain a virgin and devote her life to serving the poor and needy, rejecting a marriage proposal from a wealthy pagan suitor. This suitor, angered by her refusal and her Christian beliefs, reported her to Roman authorities. Lucy was subjected to severe torture, including the removal of her eyes—a detail that has made her the patron saint of vision and the blind. Miraculously, some accounts claim her eyesight was restored before her death, further cementing her status as a figure of divine grace. St. Lucy's story continues to inspire millions as a testament to courage, faith, and selfless love.

DON ANTONIO'S DISPATCH

As a reminder, for this year in the Diocese of Lansing, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, which is transferred to 9 December in the Ordinary Form, is not a holyday of obligation. In the Extraordinary Form, it remains on 8 December, even though it's a Sunday. But, everyone is welcome to attend the 12:10 p.m. Mass on Monday, which will be the Ordinary Form (OF) celebration of the Immaculate Conception.

Since, in the OF, the Immaculate Conception gets moved to Monday, the Feast of the Anniversary of the Dedication of the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception (our Cathedral in Lansing) gets moved to Tuesday. The Cathedral in Lansing is our Mother Church of the Diocese (though it's not the oldest). It is the visible sign of unity (along with the bishop) of our entire diocese. It reminds us

that we are not a stand-alone institution, but part of a larger whole, connected with our sister parishes across southcentral Michigan.

And lastly, Thursday is the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe. Bishop Boyea will celebrate a Mass at that parish in Flint at 6 p.m. on Thursday. I remember once reading a stat (that hopefully is accurate) that the apparition at Tepeyac ended up converting some 15 million people. That more than accounted for all those who left the Church due to the errors of Martin Luther. Our Lady of Guadalupe is the patroness of the Americas and the New Evangelization. May she continue to bring people into discipleship with her Son. iQue viva La Virgen de Guadalupe!

CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

And Mary said: "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord; my spirit rejoices in God my savior." (Luke 1:46-47) This prayer is an expression of the deep joy Mary feels, a joy that is overflowing from her heart and soul. It is a prayer of not just thanking God for what he has done, but it is a prayer that begins with a cry of admiration and praise in the presence of God. In the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd atrium, the children hear this prayer, and respond with their own prayers of praise, as they reflect upon the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth.

LADIES STUDY GROUP

EMBER DAYS-DECEMBER 18, 20, & 21

Ember Days are a long-standing tradition of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving, observed quarterly to mark the changing of the seasons. Instituted by the early Church, these days serve as a way to sanctify the natural cycles of the year and give thanks to God for His blessings. The Ember Days are observed on the Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday following specific liturgical milestones: the Feast of St. Lucy (December), the First Sunday of Lent, Pentecost, and the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (September).

While their observance is now optional in the Roman Rite, Ember Days remain a meaningful devotion for those seeking to deepen their connection to the Church's liturgical cycles.

GIVING TREE


