

The Scrutinies are a series of three rites that take place during Lent as part of the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA), designed to prepare catechumens— those who are not yet baptized—for the sacraments of initiation at the Easter Vigil. Rooted in early Church traditions, the Scrutinies are celebrated on the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent and focus on deepen- ing the spiritual conversion of the elect. These rites are intended to uncover and heal the weaknesses and sins in the hearts of the elect while strengthening what is good and leading them toward Christ. DON ANTONIO'S DISPATCH

Rejoice! We are more than halfway done with Lent! The time to celebrate the Resurrection is fairly close!! Keep going strong on your Lenten penances just for a few weeks more.

This Friday, the first Friday, a day that is usually dedicated to the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, we will have a special traveling icon of the Sacred Heart, provided by the Knights of Columbus. We'll begin with Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament at 7 p.m. (after the Soup Supper), and hear readings and pray prayers associated with the Sacred Heart of Jesus. It will last around 1 hour. Please come and spend time with our Lord in the Eucharist, and grow in your love of the Sacred Heart, which loved you so much that it was pierced to wash away your sins. The deadly sin in focus this week is wrath or anger.

The deadly sin in focus this week is wrath or anger. As St. Thomas Aquinas notes in the Summa Theologiae (IIa-IIae.clviii.1), anger is not always sinful. The sin of anger or wrath comes in when we are angry at the wrong things, or more angry than the situation requires. We can desire vengeance inasmuch as it corrects error and vice and promotes justice. But we cannot desire vengeance just to see evil happen to another person. Because of human nature, we tend to give more punishment than a crime or a bad action deserves, because we desire the other person to hurt more than the hurt we received. So the virtuous anger often flirts with crossing the line into vicious anger. And virtuous anger is anger which is in accord with reason, but for many people, their reason flies out the door when they are angry, making it difficult to be virtuously angry.

making it difficult to be virtuously angry. The remedy for anger is patience, peace, and abandonment to Divine Will. Patience waits to respond until the passions have subsided, so that we are not controlled by our emotions. Peace seeks harmony with others, not just retribution. And when we give ourselves over to God's will and timing, we recognize that He will mete out vengeance more justly and mercifully than we could ever do. However, sometimes we should respond to evil with a corrective action. Sometimes we need to defend others and the good, and it can be an act of cowardice not to stand up for what is right. Still, submit it all to God, and hopefully we'll see when there is a time to act or a time to refrain from action.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Isidore of Seville was a scholar, theologian, and Archbishop of Seville, known for preserving classical knowledge and shaping medieval intellectual thought. His most famous work, *Etymologiae*, was a vast encyclopedia covering subjects from grammar to theology and remained a key reference throughout the Middle Ages. He played a crucial



role in unifying the Visigothic kingdom under Catholicism and presided over the Fourth Council of Toledo in 633, establishing important ecclesiastical policies. His efforts in education led to the creation of cathedral schools, influencing future European learning institutions.
