MUSIC MINISTRY

The hymn "Praise to the Holiest? comes from Saibnt John Henry Newman's dramatic poem "The Dream of Gerontius" (1865), to be set by Edward Elgar towards the end of the century as a great symphonic oratorio. The story is of Gerontius dying and being carried by his guardian angel into the presence of God for judgment. As they approach the inner sanctuary, angels sing this hymn. The tune we sing was composed by the great composer, organist, and choral conductor Richard Runciman Terry. It was written for Westminster Cathedral in London, England.

WHY ORDINARY TIME?

"Ordinary Time" refers to the periods in the liturgical calendar that fall outside the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter. The term "Ordinary" comes from the Latin ordinalis, meaning "numbered" or "ordered," as the weeks follow a sequential count. Though it lacks the penitential solemnity of Lent and the joyous celebrations of Christmas and Easter, Ordinary Time remains essential for spiritual growth. It is a season dedicated to reflecting on Christ's public ministry-His teachings, miracles, and the call to discipleship. Far from being "ordinary" in the common sense of the word, this time invites believers to deepen their relationship with God and integrate the Gospel into daily life.

Gestures In the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd atrium the children learn about special movements that are called "gestures." These gestures tell us something very important, they are rich signs. The movement tells us what is happening in our liturgy. The young children are naturally attracted to movement.

LENT BIBLE STUDY

Join us this Lent as we take 6 weeks to prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ! Are we ready for the King? Are our hearts ready to accept the passion of our Lord so that we may share in his glorious Resurrection? The six weeks leading up to Easter mark our own 40 days in the desert with Jesus.

This study follows the Catholic Scripture Study format, but concentrates on the Sunday lectionary readings and incorporates the ancient method of Lectio Divina (praying the scriptures). Lectio Divina is a powerful way to 'hear' God speaking to us personally through scripture.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

Saint Scholastica was the twin sister of Saint Benedict of Nursia, the founder of Western monasticism. Scholastica devoted her life to God from an early age, embracing a life of prayer, contemplation, and religious dedication. She is best known for establishing a monastic community for women near Monte Cassino, the famous monastery founded by her brother. Her life was marked by deep spiritual wisdom and a strong bond with Benedict, whom she visited annually. During their final encounter, Scholastica sensed her death was near and pleaded with Benedict to stay longer to continue their discussion of heavenly matters. When he refused, bound by his strict monastic rules, she prayed, and a sudden storm arose, preventing him from leaving. Benedict realized this was a divine sign and stayed with her in prayer and conversation throughout the night. Three days later,

Scholastica passed away, and Benedict saw her soul ascend to heaven in the form of a dove, symbolizing her purity and devotion.
