STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The Stations of the Cross is a devotion that reflects on Jesus Christ's journey to His crucifixion. 14 stations depict key moments, from His condemnation by Pilate to His burial. Originating from pilgrimages to Jerusalem, this practice allows us to meditate on Christ's suffering, fostering prayer, repentance, and spiritual growth. Each station highlights events such as Jesus carrying His cross, meeting His mother, falling, being nailed to the cross, and His death. The devotion is often observed during Lent and Good Friday, and helps us unite our struggles with Christ's sacrifice, deepening faith and appreciation of God's mercy.

DON ANTONIO'S DISPATCH

Tuesday we celebrate the Annunciation of the Lord to the Blessed Virgin Mary. While this is a solemnity, the highest rank of feast day in the Church, it is not, surprisingly enough, a holyday of obligation. I say surprisingly enough, because the Incarnation is at the center of our faith. Still, one is not required to attend Mass on this day. If you want to attend Mass, we'll have our usual 12:10 p.m. Mass. You'll notice that on this day when we say the Creed in the Ordinary Form, we'll genuflect (as always happens in the Extraordinary Form). We do so in humility of the great and central mystery of our faith. On the other days where we profess the Creed in the Ordinary Form, we are asked to make a profound bow (except Christmas, which also has us genuflect).

Unrelated, I have noticed people starting to drop off religious items they don't want on the table or near the entrances. **Please do not do this.** It makes our entry ways look disheveled. We are not the dumping grounds for used,

old, or unwanted religious goods. You need to respectfully

dispose of them yourselves. Thanks for your cooperation!
This week, our deadly sin that we consider is envy. St. Thomas Aquinas defines envy as "sorrow for another's good (Summa Theologica, IIa-IIae.xxxvi.1). This is when we are upset that another person has some good thing, whether it be a possession or even simply a good name. This sin usually (but not always) arises when we feel we have some good as well, but that another person has it better (as we don't tend to worry about gifts that others have that we don't want or have). And besides just wanting what another has, envy means we don't want that person to have that good.

The best antidote for envy is gratitude. When we thank God, we realize how many blessings we have received from God, and we stop worrying about what others have. Or, if you're feeling envious, praise God for the gifts that the other person has.

CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

We know that silence is necessary to prepare our-selves to encounter God. It is in silence that the religious or spiritual sense of the child may be developed. Silence leads the child to a relationship with him or herself, through the listening of his or her own breathing. As children become conscious of their inner silence, they realize that this allows them to be able to listen to and answer God. Silence is a great help for the child's prayer life. At home, you may want to practice quiet time at the prayer you may want to practice quiet time at the prayer table. Silence is necessary for prayer. • Create a card for your family prayer table with the words, "Be Still." • At home, invite your child to sit comfortably at the prayer table, with his or her body still, and eyes closed. Depending upon the age of the child, allow for a few minutes (or more) of silence. Discuss what was heard. • Do you practice/ model silence in your prayer life?

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. John of Capistrano was an Italian Franciscan friar, preacher, and diplomat known for his zealous missionary work and military leadership. Initially trained as a lawyer, he entered religious life after a profound spiritual conversion and joined the Observant branch of the Franciscans, advocating for strict adherence to monastic discipline. He became a renowned preacher, traveling across Europe to combat heresy, promote moral reform, and inspire devotion. His most famous achievement was leading Christian forces, alongside Hungarian general John Hunvadi, in the 1456 Battle of Belgrade against the advancing Ottoman Turks. His rallying of troops and spiritual leadership contributed to a decisive victory that temporarily halted Ottoman expansion into Europe. Canonized in 1690, St. John of Capistrano is remembered as the "Soldier Saint".
