

ALLELUIA

During Lent, the Church refrains from saying "Alleluia" as a way of reflecting the solemn and penitential nature of the season. "Alleluia," which means "Praise the Lord," is a joyful expression of celebration, typically associated with the resurrection of Christ. However, Lent is a time of preparation, repentance, and reflection on Christ's suffering and sacrifice. By omitting the "Alleluia," the Church creates a sense of longing and anticipation, making its triumphant return at Easter even more meaningful. This liturgical silence helps the faithful enter more deeply into the spirit of Lent, focusing on humility, conversion, and spiritual renewal.

DON ANTONIO'S DISPATCH

This weekend we have the kickoff to the 2025 Diocesan Services Appeal. This is money that the Diocese of Lansing collects each year to help run the curial offices in Lansing, which support parish ministry. I know that we just finished our Diocesan Capital Campaign, so I get if there is a bit of donor fatigue out there. And perhaps you, like me, gave to the campaign, so the DSA gift this year might be a bit smaller. I understand.

At the same time, many parishioners chose not to give to the capital campaign. I would especially encourage those parishioners to be generous to DSA. The DSA funds things that we cannot do on our own as a parish. One thing that I know is near and dear to our hearts is seminarian education. DSA helps to ensure that our seminarians can focus on their education, rather than the money it costs to go to seminary. College seminarians like Glen, Joseph, and Henry do have to supply funding from their families and other sources, but all of graduate seminary is free (except books).

I know that, given the very strong immigration debate going on, some of you will have questions about Catholic Charities and their involvement with immigration.

Last year, 8.22% of the DSA went to Catholic Charities in the Diocese of Lansing (not the nationwide Catholic Charities). None of the five Catholic Charities entities in the Diocese of Lansing have programs focused on working with illegal immigrants. No DSA money even goes to Refugee Resettlement Programs. Though Catholic Charities in Ingham, Eaton, and Clinton Counties does participate in a program where legal refugees are vetted by the Federal Government, none of that funding comes from DSA. The Catholic Charities money from DSA is used for Catholic counseling, food programs for the hungry in our communities, or clothing closets for low-income families.

I hope you will be generous with DSA. Given the money we pledged for the capital campaign, it would be nice to reach our DSA goal, which is \$32,732.11. If every family gave \$200 (and it can be spread over a number of months), we would reach our goal. But, I realize that this may not be possible, so please give what you feel is responsible.

CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

The Good Shepherd knows each sheep, even if there are many sheep. He calls his sheep, and gradually, they become accustomed to His voice; they listen to Him and follow Him. In this way a precious relationship is established; a thread of love binds the sheep always more closely to their Shepherd. In the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd atrium, the children come to know that the Shepherd's voice is powerful and supremely patient; it never tires of calling and reaches out even to those sheep who are far away, beyond the sheepfold. Slowly, they, too, turn to hear His voice, and they gather together into one great flock.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Peter Damian was an influential reformer, cardinal, and theologian during the 11th century. Born in Italy, he entered monastic life as a young man and became a member of the hermitage of Fonte Avellana, later serving as its prior. A zealous advocate for ecclesiastical reform, he fought against simony and clerical corruption, particularly the practice of priests violating celibacy. His most famous work, *Liber Gomorrhianus*, was a fierce denunciation of sexual immorality among the clergy. He played a key role in enforcing the reforms of Pope Gregory VII, including efforts to assert papal authority over secular rulers. Despite his high-ranking position, he remained committed to the ascetic ideals of monasticism, often retreating to a life of prayer and contemplation. He was canonized and later declared a Doctor of the Church in 1828 for his theological writings.
