### Q: Why do we celebrate the Holy Innocents before the Epiphany?

**Fr. Anthony:** Thanks for paying attention to the Gospel and my homily (where I mentioned King Herod killing the innocents after the appearance of the Magi) at the Epiphany Mass!! Epiphany is one of the oldest liturgical celebrations, even older

than Christmas (some evidence of its celebration perhaps even as early at before AD 215). The Feast of the Holy Innocents came about sometime not before the end of the fourth century, and not later than the end of the fifth century (late 300s to late 400s). Its placement was connected to the birth of Christ, rather than the Epiphany, because it was for the newborn Christ Child that the Holy Innocents were martyred. This is similar to how we hear the preaching of St. John the Baptist during Advent, even though St. John's preaching would have taken place before Christ began His public ministry at the age of 30, rather than before His birth.

### **DON ANTONIO'S DISPATCH**

Starting 18 January and going through 25 January, the Church celebrates the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Christ prayed that all would be one, as He is one with the Father and the Holy Spirit. Sadly, due to sin, those who believe in Jesus as Lord are not all united in faith, government, or all the sacraments. Our witness as followers of Christ is diminished when we disagree with each other, so we should do what we can to work for unity in the truth and charity. This doesn't mean that we water down our faith to a point that everyone can agree, but that we help people see why the Catholic Church has maintained the faith undefiled since Christ entrusted His Church to the Apostles and their successors, the bishops.

successors, the bishops. This year is especially a big year for those who hold to the faith of Nicea, the first ecumenical council, that professed that Jesus is consubstantial (homoousious is the Greek term) with the Father. It is the 1700th anniversary of that Council. Further, Catholics and Orthodox have a common celebration date for Easter/Pascha this year, which doesn't happen too regularly. We pray especially for unity in the truth and charity between Catholics and Orthodox. Monday, the office will be closed in honor of Martin Luther King, Jr. While we have come a long way since the 1960s, we still have work to do to make sure that we are not contributing to unjust discrimination. Biases can run deep. We pray that the Holy Spirit will help heal in us any prejudice that denies the dignity of every human person. On Tuesday, 28 January, after the 12:10 p.m. Mass

Too often, children (who have sometimes wandered away from the faith) do not know what to do after a parent or family member dies. This presentation will help you know what the Church expects and will connect you to those who can help you with those plans. I will present about the liturgical life of the Church surrounding funerals, and we'll have a representative from Swartz Funeral Home and New Calvary Catholic Cemetery to present on their roles and answer any questions you may have. ### **CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD**

The mystery of the Kingdom of God is one of the greatest mysteries of our faith. It was such an important part of what Jesus wanted to communicate during His time on earth that there are over forty parables about the Kingdom in the Gospels. In honor of the greatness of this mystery, and the depth of joy that the children take in pondering it, this season of Ordinary Time in both the 3-6 year old and 6-9 year old Atria, is often spent in pondering the parables of the Kingdom of God.

In the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd atrium, the children hear the parable of the mustard seed and come to know about the transformative growth that occurs within the seed. They will reflect upon the power and strength of God that resides in the smallest of all seeds.

### SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Sebastian, a 3rd-century martyr, was born in Narbonne, Gaul, and raised in Milan. He served as a captain in Emperor Diocletian's Praetorian Guard while secretly aiding persecuted Christians. When his faith was discovered, he was sentenced to death, tied to a tree, and shot with arrows. Miraculously surviving, he was nursed back to health by Irene of Rome but later confronted Diocletian, leading to his execution by beating. His body was retrieved by a Christian woman, Lucina, and buried in the catacombs, now the site of the Basilica of St. Sebastian. He is the patron saint of athletes and those afflicted by plagues, his legacy endures as a testament to courage and unwavering devotion.
