MUSIC MINISTRY

DAILY EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE

A daily examination of conscience is an essential Catholic practice that allows us to prayerfully reflect on our thoughts, words, and actions in light of God's will. Rooted in Scripture and the teachings of the Church, this practice helps us recognize our sins, grow in virtue, and strengthen our relationship with God. By regularly assessing how we have followed or strayed from Christ's teachings, we develop a deeper sense of humility, repentance, and gratitude for God's mercy. This self-reflection prepares our hearts for the Sacrament of Reconciliation, making us more aware of our need for forgiveness and grace. It also fosters a spirit of accountability, guiding us to make better moral choices and live more intentionally according to our Catholic faith. The Ignatian tradition, particularly through St. Ignatius of Loyola's Examen, emphasizes not only recognizing sins but also acknowledging God's presence and blessings throughout the day. Over time, this practice helps us become more attuned to the movements of the Holy Spirit, leading to a life of greater holiness, inner peace, and a closer union with God.

DON ANTONIO'S DISPATCH

This week includes the Ember Days of Lent. On Wednesday and Saturday we could fast, and then only have one meal (usually dinner) with meat. On Friday, in addition to abstaining from meat, we could fast. This is a great way to unite ourselves to the cross of Christ. Also, don't forget about our Soup Suppers and Stations on Fridays of Lent. We also have Stations of the Cross after the 12:10 p.m. Mass.

In these six Sundays of Lent (the five Sundays of Lent and Palm Sunday) I want to encourage us to continue to grow in our spiritual life. So I'm going to be highlighting the seven deadly sins (I'll combine two in one week) and how we can work to continue to root them out of our life.

This week I want to focus on sloth. The Latin word is acedia, which had the meaning of being indifferent to one's religious duties. Practically speaking, sloth can refer to a certain laziness or aversion to practicing our faith. I think one of the most common examples of this sin is when we choose to skip Mass, or choose to scroll through social media, listen to podcasts, or watch YouTube videos in place of prayer. There's nothing wrong in se (in itself) with social media, podcasts, or YouTube videos, but we need to make sure that we prioritize our relationship with God ahead of those things. My suggestion for this week is to require even a short prayer before going on Facebook, X, Instagram, podcasts, or YouTube. That way we know we're putting God first.

CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

Psalm 23:1-2 - The Lord is my Shepherd, I have everything I need. In green pastures you let me graze; to safe waters you lead me; When one is entrusted to such a shepherd, then one can want for nothing. The shepherd provides everything for his sheep; for their eating and drinking and rest. "Waters are especially rare and precious in so arid a land as Israel; for the shepherd to procure water for his sheep is something very great for Jewish listeners. (Ways to Nurture the Relationship with God by Sofia Cavalletti, p 37) In the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Atrium, the children reflect upon the words of Psalm 23. In introducing the Psalms to the child, it builds the child's prayer vocabulary.

Join us this Wednesday as we prepare ourselves for the coming of Christ! Are we ready for the King? Are our hearts ready to accept the passion of our Lord so that we may share in his glorious Resurrection? The six weeks leading up to Easter mark our own 40 days in the desert with Jesus.

This study follows the Catholic Scripture Study format, but concentrates on the Sunday lectionary readings and incorporates the ancient method of Lectio Divina (praying the scriptures). Lectio Divina is a powerful way to 'hear' God speaking to us personally through scripture.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Frances was born into a wealthy and noble family in Rome, she was married at a young age to Lorenzo Ponziani. Despite her initial desire to become a nun, she embraced her role as a wife and mother, dedicating herself to serving the poor and sick while manag-



ing her household with great humility and devotion. She is known for founding the Oblates of Mary, a lay religious community for women who wished to live a pious life without taking monastic vows. She endured personal hardships, including the loss of children and the turmoil of war, yet remained steadfast in her faith, offering comfort and aid to those in need. Her life exemplified a balance between worldly duties and deep spiritual commitment, making her a model of holiness for both religious and laypeople.
