#### **MUSIC MINISTRY**

"...and sing the love amazing..."

In his book "The Stories of Hymns," Fr. George Rutler wrote: "Properly sung, the Mass has its own liturgical hymns." In the first thousand years of the Church, sacred hymns were revered as being particularly holy, with many of them being exclusively performed by clergy. This tradition continues in the Latin Mass, where the priest sings the "Pater Noster" and, historically, only a bishop would sing the "Gloria" until the 11th century. The "Agnus Dei" was introduced to the Mass in the late 7th century and was initially sung by the choir. The oldest hymn of the Mass is the "Sanctus" Today, the practice has evolved, and nearly all of these hymns are sung by the entire congregation in both the Ordinary and Extraordinary forms of the Mass. "And all because a hymn was sung in the Upper Room."

## **THE FOURTH & FIFTH SORROW**


Mary's fourth sorrow is the Meeting of Jesus on the Way to Calvary. As Jesus carried His cross through the streets of Jerusalem, weak and beaten, Mary encountered Him. The weight of His suffering was unimaginable, and witnessing His pain deepened her sorrow. Though she could not alleviate His burden, her silent presence conveyed profound love and support.

Mary's fifth sorrow is the Crucifixion and Death of Jesus. Standing at the foot of the cross, she watched her Son endure the ultimate suffering. The sight of Jesus hanging on the cross, mocked and ridiculed, pierced her heart. In this moment, Mary's sorrow was both personal and universal, as she grieved not only for her Son but also for the weight of the sins of the world that He bore.

Together, these sorrows reveal the depth of a mother's love and the profoundness of her faith. In both moments, she faced the unbearable pain of witnessing her Son's suffering and death, yet she remained steadfast, accepting her role in God's plan of salvation. Her sorrow was not one of despair but of deep compassion and solidarity with Jesus' mission. Through her quiet presence on the way to Calvary and at the foot of the cross, Mary exemplifies the strength that comes from trusting in God's will, even in the face of overwhelming anguish. Her sorrows invite us to reflect on the power of love, sacrifice, and faith in the midst of life's greatest challenges.

#### **SAINT OF THE WEEK**

Born around 907, Wenceslaus rose to power in 921 after the death of his father, taking control of Bohemia. He actively promoted Christianity, building churches, encouraging education, and fostering peaceful relations with Christian rulers. His policies strengthened ties with the empire but alienated the pagan nobility. In 935, he was assassinated by his brother Boleslaus, who opposed Wenceslaus's pro-Christian stance.

#### **COFFEE & DONUTS**


