SAINT OF THE WEEK



Saint Ambrose was a pivotal figure in early Christianity, known for his role as the Bishop of Milan, a theologian, and a defender against Arianism. Initially a Roman provincial governor, he was unexpectedly chosen as bishop, rapidly baptized, and ordained due to his reputation for wisdom and leadership. Ambrose wielded significant influence, not only through his eloquent sermons and theological writings but also in his assertive stance against imperial overreach, famously compelling Emperor Theodosius I to perform public penance after the massacre of Thessalonica. He introduced innovations in Church liturgy, including antiphonal chant, and his ethical writings, such as *De Officiis Ministrorum*, profoundly shaped Christian thought. Perhaps his most enduring legacy was his role in the conversion of Saint Augustine, cementing his place as a key architect of Western Christianity and a revered Doctor of the Church.

Happy New Year! We begin our new liturgical year today with the first Sunday of Advent. And just like we have New (calendar) Year resolutions, perhaps we can make the following resolutions for our lives as disciples (I stole/adapted this from St. Mary Magdalene Orthodox Church in Fenton; the Orthodox celebrate the new liturgical year in September):

- 1. Read the Bible and the Lives of the Saints
- 2. Take decisions together with God
- 3. Observe fasts and abstinence throughout the year
- 4. Assist someone who feels lonely
- 5. Donate the things you don't need
- 6. Don't miss Mass on Sundays and Holydays
- 7. Get involved in volunteering
- 8. Go on a pilgrimage
- 9. Be forgiving
- Receive the Eucharist more often (presuming you're in a state of grace)
- 11. Share the faith on social media
- 12. Sign-up for our email notifications

This is also our final push to get people to donate to Stewardship for Saints and Scholars. I know that times are tough for many, and I appreciate the sacrificial gifts that many of you have already made to the campaign to support Catholic education. I also know that many of you homeschool, which is a great way to educate a child, when one has the requisite gifts. This is our parish's way to support Catholic education in the Diocese of Lansing. CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD

The first prophecy the child hears in the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd Atrium is from Isaiah 9:1 (or 9:2, depending on the translation): "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light." The comparison of light to darkness is frequently used by the prophets in referring to the Messiah. The images used by the prophets are not simply poetic language; they are always connected to reality: the Messiah is light in a real sense, because He will bring a new knowledge of God to us, and this knowledge is light for our mind and it warms our heart.

DECEMBER 6-ST. NICHOLAS' FEAST DAY

St. Nicholas Day, celebrated on December 6th, involves the tradition of leaving small gifts like chocolates, oranges, nuts, and candies in children's shoes or stockings the night before. The orange symbolizes the gold coins St. Nicholas gave to the needy, while chocolate, often shaped like coins or St. Nicholas figures, represents his generosity. Children leave their polished shoes or stockings out on December 5th, waking the next morning to find them filled with treats as a reminder of St. Nicholas's kindness and the spirit of giving.

At both entrances of the church there are small bags with chocolate coins and mandarin oranges, these are to assist you in celebrating this great feast day! Please take one for each of your children.
